Value education was emphasized in various documents from time to time. For example, University grant commission (1948-49) said that all the educational institutes should start their work from two-minute silence, first year degree courses should teach about religious leaders, second year students should be taught about the religious leaders of the world and in third year they should be taught about problems related to religion.secondary education commission in 1952-53 said: "The supreme end of the educative process should be the training of the character and personality of students in such a way that they will be able to realize their full potentialities and contribute to the wellbeing of the community."The Education Commission of 1964-66 was a commission set up under the chairmanship of D.S Kothari. It was comprehensive in nature because it reviewed and covered almost all the aspects of the education. As per the commission the main aim of the education were to increase productivity, develop national and social unity, develop democracy, develop moral social and spiritual values. The commission recommended that these values be taught "with the help, wherever possible, of the ethical teachings of great religions." Agreeing with the Sri Prakash Committee Report, it recommended "direct moral instruction" for which "one or two periods a week should be set aside in the school time-table.

The national education policy (1968) focused on the moral and social values. Hunter commission was formed under the chairmanship of William Hunter in year 1882 and he was appointed by Lord Ripon, who was the viceroy of India at that time. Hunter commission laid emphasis on moral and physical education for the personality and character development of the students studying in school."The national education policy (1986) has also put efforts to promote the essential values and its importance. It said that education should act as a mean to develop the social and moral values. Education should develop values for the welfare of society and nation. Later on, the program of action (1992) gave it report regarding importance of values. It said that value education should be added at all the levels of schooling including secondary stage. The govt. report based on value education (Chavan's committee report1999) supported the value education. The national curriculum framework for school education 2000, focused on the disappearance and fading of the social and moral values from all the levels of the schooling. The NCF 2005 also gave importance to value education (Dubey Geeta, 2002) It focused on the value education by focusing on the peace education. The new education policy was given in year 2020 which also emphasized the value education at each and every stage of education that is at elementary level, secondary, senior secondary and higher level. NEP said that not only cognitive development is required for a child but a holistic or all-round development is needed and value education is given a major importance for all round development. The vision of the Policy is to instill among the learners a deep-rooted pride in being Indian, not only in thought, but also in spirit, intellect, and deeds, as well as to develop knowledge, skills, values, and dispositions that support responsible commitment to human rights, sustainable development and living, and global well-being, thereby reflecting a truly global citizen (NEP2020). Developing values and teaching values is not an overnight process, it needs to be done stepwise as we build a house brick by brick. Value education is always needed as there is a continuous downfall in the value system of children today, increased crime and violence, effects of mass media on youth and children.

# **NEED OF MORAL VALUES**


